From our Minister, the Revd Malcolm Ingham:

Are you ready for Christmas?

Maybe you're one of those really organised people – you bought all this year's presents in last year's January sales. You picked up the wrapping paper when it was on offer the week after Christmas....





..... you ordered your turkey early.... and booked your supermarket Christmas delivery as soon as it became available. Maybe that's you. Maybe that's not, don't panic, there's still time, it's only November.

But even the best laid plans can sometimes go awry - we once had our turkey order cancelled because of Bird Flu and besides, even if you have Christmas all sorted, what about Easter? Have you thought about that?


Look, I'm sorry if I've sent some of you into a meltdown by talking about Christmas already, but did you know that God was planning Christmas and Easter way back - back even before the creation of the universe?

You see, nothing we do ever takes God by surprise, God always knew that the human beings he lovingly made were going to go their own way, rebel against him and, frankly, make a bit of a mess of things. God always knew that we would need him to save us from sin and its consequence which is separation from him for all eternity, so, more than stocking up the food cupboard, or stockpiling tinsel, God planned to come amongst us, to show us who he really is and to pay the price for our rebellion, to take our just punishment upon himself so that we could be forgiven. The Bible reminds us in Matthew 1:23 that this is what is called "Immanuel, which means God with us" – the very thing (or person) that we remember and celebrate at Christmas.

But that's also why, when we read the Old Testament of the Bible, we can see it pointing us to Jesus again and again and again. It's not a coincidence; it was always God's amazing plan.

Isn't it reassuring that God doesn't just throw things together and hope it will work? God meticulously and perfectly plans everything he does, and nothing derails his good and perfect plans.

So, if this is the month that you do a bit of early Christmas shopping, or make your Christmas pudding, or write some Christmas cards to get ahead, then, as



you do, remember that, as I Peter I:12 reminds us, God was planning to send His Son to live with us and to rescue us before even the stars burst into life or the galaxies swirled into existence.

Now, that is some forward planning, God must think a lot of you!







What must we do? A reflection from Rosemary.



"What must we do?" the crowd asked Jesus. (John 6: 28-29)

Trying to live a good Christian life can be absolutely exhausting, can't it? If you're a Christian, you're meant to visit the sick and those in prison, put on endless coffee mornings to raise funds for your local church or for Christian Aid, join the teams that keep the churchyard tidy and the church clean, ring the bells, organise events for young people, welcome newcomers to the parish, make jam and cakes for the church bazaar, attend PCC meetings and Deanery Synod: the list is endless. And you're also supposed to be nice to the vicar, indeed be nice to everyone. And never forget to say your prayers.

Being a church member can make you so busy that there's a danger of losing sight of what it's all there for, why we have a church anyway.

A clergyman friend of ours, hassled as most of the clergy are with too many things to do and remember, too many appointments, too much paperwork, too many parishes to look after- this friend said one day recently: "when all's said and done, all that really matters is God."

"Believe in me and in him who sent me" was Jesus' reply to that crowd. So what must we do?

The crowd in the Gospel story are, it seems, activists. Good works people. What must we <u>do</u>? they ask Jesus.

And when he gives them what must have seemed to them this somewhat unsatisfactory answer: "Don't do anything, just believe in me," they persist in questioning him.

What do you do then, they ask.

Come on, they're saying, where are your credentials?

What sign do you do, that we may believe you?

What work do you perform?

This exchange comes almost immediately after John's account of the feeding of the five thousand.


So I suppose the people are after more spectacular miracles of that kind, public displays of Jesus's divine power. Show us some more party tricks like that, they're saying, and then, maybe then we'll believe. Believe that you're the son of God, that you came down from Heaven as you claim.

But that's not the way Jesus works, is it?

He doesn't indulge them with another spectacular miracle; instead he makes this amazing claim.

It's not what they do-not what we do- it's believing in him that counts. And for Jesus himself, too, it's not what he <u>does</u>, not the spectacular miracles he performs, it's what he <u>is</u> that matters.

"I am the bread of life", he says. "My Father gives you the true bread from Heaven, the bread that gives life to the world, and I am that bread. When you read further on in this Gospel, you see that these statements Jesus makes - that he is God's bread, the bread that came down from Heaven to satisfy people's spiritual needs –(just as, in Moses' time, the manna that God gave the people in the desert had satisfied their physical hunger)- these statements don't reassure his hearers- rather they antagonise them. Especially when he goes on to talk about giving people his flesh to eat and his blood to drink. The people who had been eagerly following him now leave him in droves.



So what must we do to perform the works of God?

Only believe, says Jesus, that's all we need to do. Only believe, and all the rest will follow.

The discernment to know God's will,

the energy and obedience to do it.

The love for others that reflects God's love for us.

The readiness to forgive as he has forgiven us. The sheer overbrimming gratitude for all that God gives us every day. Above all for the gift of faith, for our belief in Jesus whom the Father sent. And don't forget:

"When all's said and done, all that really matters is God."
